Unusual Times By A.Soule

These are unusual times. There is no denying the feeling of despair at seeing the rising figures of those infected and those dying because of the virus. It is a global battle, we are up against the invisible enemy: the enemy which stalks bars, cafes, restaurants and mass gatherings.

This is not the first time the world has faced pandemics. There was the plague of 1660 and the Spanish flu of 1918, both which killed off thousands. Obviously, people survived through these crises, but public memories of these are mixed.

One thing is for sure is that crises do not as always bring out the best in us. Fear can make us do things which we would ordinarily be ashamed to own up to.

A couple of days ago, rather late in the evening I went to a local superstore, looking to buy a few essentials. As you would expect with so much of this being in the news, there was hardly anything on the shelves. It took a while getting used to seeing the large store with so many empty shelves; which does make one wonder whether we are facing a famine or the virus.

It was late evening that day and behind me in store came in a young family, the parents appeared to have come straight after finishing work. It was hard not see the look of utter dismay on their faces at the empty shelves - with nothing left for them to buy that day. The mother was in tears.

The shop assistant told us that shoppers come in early to take in 'all sorts - bread, vegetables soaps, toilet rolls 'in bulk. She mentioned 'they want to get in first'. The irony is that there is no shortage of these things as such, and there is no indication that shelves wouldn't be restocked the next day. And yet, the ransacking of shelves continues.

But this the nature of the beast (crises). I was reading Daniel Defoe's Diary of the 1660 Plague, which mentions that despite some incidents of bravery shown in the face of death all around them; people became immensely selfish. It was wife against the husband, husband against the wife, neighbour against neighbour. It was every man for himself – for the fear of catching death.

An Article I read in the New York Times mentioned that despite the Spanish flu killing over a million people in America in 1918, there were surprisingly very few books or historical accounts written on that. There is though the record that at its peak, there was a desperate call for volunteers to care for sick children, which went callously unheeded. The authorities had pleaded with the local community making it clear that there was no one to give the children food as the death rate was very high, but people, 'much respected' as they were held back. David Brooks, the author of the article I mentioned explains that the possible reason for there not being many records of the flu was 'because people didn't like who they had become. It was a shameful memory and therefore suppressed.'

Self-sacrifice and caring about your neighbour are essential aspects of being a Christian. But it is so easy to forget all that in times of crisis; even Peter denied Christ three times, fearing death. But that story didn't end there, it was with him later on that the Church began, and he wasn't in the end afraid to face death when it came to him.

It is true that the common decency expected by society can never be taken for granted and human behaviour can never be completely predicted, but it is also true ordinary people can be transformed into heroes of the day, doing everything they can at the time needed. Peter after all turned out to be better than he thought who he was. We are all weak, but it is our relationship with God, with God at its focus, which can transform lives.

Understanding who we are as Christians is important especially in these times. I am often reminded of a quote from a long-standing Church member (from a previous Church I used to go to): `Being a Christian makes me better than I am'.

Gather.....

- As you gather find a place that is comfortable and have the resources ready for the activities, prayer or response times ready.
- Choose 3 members to light the 3 candles (engage all ages)

Opening words of praise with lighting of 3 candles -

I will light a light in the name of the Maker, who lit the world and gave everything life.

I will light a light in the name of the Son, who saved the world and stretched out his hand to me.

I will light a light in the name of the Spirit, who is present everywhere in the world and gives me strength.

Together:

We will light three lights for the trinity of love: God above us, God beside us, God beneath us; The beginning, The end and the Everlasting one.

Reflection time: Today is Palm Sunday - The promised King was finally coming into Jerusalem and the people crowded the streets to cheer his arrival. Can you imagine a time when you've been really excited about someone coming, have you been outside waiting or looking out of the window expecting them to arrive? This is how the crowd felt a King was arriving. Imagine you're a person in the crowd waiting and expecting a King — how does that make you feel? (share within your gathering)

If Jesus were to arrive in amongst you now physically – would you be cheering?

Interactive Learning..... The people believed the King had come to save them, they believed he would be in robes, with a crown and servants but Jesus came on a humble colt, however they were not disappointed because they'd been told their King would arrive on a colt, they still believed he had come to save them with the shout of Hosanna – meaning to be saved.

In amongst all the excitement and cheering Jesus knew by the end of the week he would facing death on the cross and most of the crowd would have deserted him.

Introduce a palm cross.......On palm Sunday we share & give out palm crosses, we wave crosses as the crowd would have waved palms when Jesus entered the city, we wave crosses to remember Jesus saving us, to welcome Jesus into our lives and as our King.



Demonstrate how to make a paper cross and allow time & space for people to make their own AND/OR Create this lovely palm leaf picture. If you do have paints in the house, paint your hands and print! AND/OR make a palm leaf out of building bricks - be <u>creative!</u>



Whilst creating chat about the following questions & Share stories...

How did the crowd react to Jesus' grand entrance?

Think about those times when you have expected a visitor and the happiness you felt – I wonder if Jesus felt the same as you & the crowd?

What would you like to say to Jesus today, as you welcome him as your King?

Write a prayer on your Cross/Picture







<u>Do Something Beautiful by R. York Moore</u> In Do Something Beautiful, York Moore shows you how to:

Mission - Beryl baker

Beryl is a nurse who works in Paraguay. She has been on the mission field for over 50 years and we have supported her as a mission partner throughout that time.



A message from Beryl's friend Julie Fagan

As I hadn't heard from Beryl for so long, I tried this afternoon and got through to her on a very poor connection in the Chaco! We were both astonished. We kept losing contact but Beryl was able to tell me the following.

There was a partial closure last week but now everything is mostly stopped in Paraguay to stop the spread of the corona virus. There have only been a few cases as far as Beryl knows and she hasn't seen any there, only pneumonia and Dengue fever, a lot of those.

All the large supermarkets are closed and the schools. There is a curfew at 6 pm and anyone breaking it gets a large fine from the police. They are allowed to go for essential foods in smaller supermarkets presumably and medicines. The Mennonite colonies are the same.

The petrol station at Rio Verde is still open because they sell fuel but no supplies are getting through so the shelves are nearly empty of any fresh produce. People are managing with what they had already. Beryl says she is ok because she has some basic foods.

The weather is very hot -40 - 41 degrees C and they are entering drought conditions. Chris Hawksbee was in touch from Asuncion and said they had a little rain yesterday.

Tim Curtis was due to come to the UK in April. He was able to get on one of the last flights out of Paraguay, to France and arrived yesterday. Beryl doesn't know if he has arrived in the UK yet. He is going to stay with his father and sister.

Severiano, who was helping Beryl, became very unhelpful and stopped working. Beryl thinks he is very anxious about his daughter and depressed. He left yesterday but his younger brother in law, Bernardino, has started work in his place. He is in his early twenties, Beryl said. Beryl is very grateful to the Lord for his provision of Bernardino.

Beryl asked about the situation here in the UK and I was able to say a little.

Communication was very difficult so after being cut off yet again, we said our farewells. I'm still amazed that we managed to communicate! Thank you Lord!

Ask Lauraine


Our resident theological thinker answers your questions.

"How did God feed all the animals on the Ark?", Colin & Judy.

God tells Noah in Genesis 6, after setting out how to build the ark and who/what would be in it, in verse 21 "You are to take every kind of food that is to be eaten and store it away as food for you and them." So we can assume that Noah did as he was instructed as he had done all along.



"Tell those woodpeckers to STOP!



I found this mock up of what the inside of the ark might have looked like. The various food stuffs being stored along the sides on each floor. Assuming the animals were arranged in family groups, each group would have eaten roughly the same thing so that would have saved space.

It's worth mentioning here that 'experts' in this field have surmised that there would have been around 16,000 animals in the ark plus the eight people, more than enough they say to keep that number of animals alive.

Also remember we are not talking about a 'des res' here the aim is survival not luxury.

Water could have been 'piped' into troughs using bamboo as the Chinese do, and there would have been plenty of water! Food could be dealt with in the same way through self- feeders, just like we feed the birds in our gardens.

Meat could have been dried for the meat eaters amongst the animals, plus of course fish. Noah certainly had time to do this whilst building the ark (around 75yrs?). Some commentators argue that nothing and no-one ate

meat until after the flood anyway so would not have been a problem! (Gen 9:3).

But what about the poo and the smell? Well in farming communities man and beast have often shared the same space. Perhaps our noses are just too sensitive. As far as the poo is concerned the floors on each level could have been slated as in pet shops and the waste trampled into a space below. Or sloping floors directing the manure into a central gutter. This waste would have had to be emptied overboard.

Whilst that year on the ark would not have been comfortable it certainly was doable.

This is not a definitive answer, just my musings, only God has the answer - as always!



Ann's simple recipes for everyone

St Paul's resident culinary queen Ann Easter shares some of her recipes with you.

Quiche

<u>Ingredients</u>

18oz (500g) Plain flour
7ozs (200g) Butter
Pinch of salt
2 Eggs
4ozs (120g) Mature cheddar
2 Rashers of bacon
1 Red onion
½ pint (280ml) of milk



Instructions

To make the pastry base

Sift the flour into a large bowl add the diced butter and rub in with your fingertips until the mixture resembles fine breadcrumbs.

Stir in a pinch of salt, then add 2-3 tbsp water and mix to a firm dough.

Knead the dough briefly and gently on a floured surface then roll out.

Line your flan tin(s) with the dough and bake for 15 minutes at gas mark 4 / 160 °C.

To make the filling

Chop the bacon and the onion and beat the eggs.

Mix the bacon, onions, eggs, cheese & milk in a large bowl.

Pour the mixture into the tin(s) and bake for 40 minutes on gas mark 5 / 170°C, till firm to the touch.

Try adding other ingredients such as peppers or broccoli

2. JOHN ROSS WRITES: -WHY WE BELIEVE JESUS ROSE FROM THE DEAD

If Jesus did not rise from the dead, the Christian faith is a foolish fantasy. However, if the resurrection of Jesus did occur, it confirms his life, message and atoning work. It is the basis of our hope of life beyond the grave.

Jesus is Alive and the evidence is overwhelming.

Here are some of the reasons we can be so sure.

1. Jesus predicted his resurrection (Matt 16:21; Mark 9:9-10; John 2:18-22)

2. The Old Testament prophesied it (Ps 16:10;compare Acts 2:25-31;13:33-37)

3. The tomb was empty and the grave clothes vacant.

If those who opposed Jesus wished to silence his disciples, all they had to do was produce a body but they could not. (John 20:3-9)

4. Many people saw the resurrected Jesus. They looked on his face, touched him, heard his voice and saw him eat. (Matt. 28:16-20; Luke 24:13-39; John 20;11-29; John 21:1-9; Acts 1:6-11; ! Cor. 15:3-8)

5. The lives of the disciples were dramatically changed. Though they fled and even denied Jesus at the time of his arrest, they later feared no one in their proclamation of the risen Jesus. (Matt.26:56, 69-75)

6. The resurrection was the central message of the early church.

The church grew with an unwavering conviction that Jesus had risen and was the Lord of the church. (Acts 4:33; 5:30-32; Rom. 5:24)

7. Men and women today testify that the power of the risen Jesus has transformed their lives.

We know that Jesus is alive not only because of the historical and biblical evidence but also because he has miraculously touched our lives. John Ross
