

An Easter message from Bishop James

'Walking together', whether literally as on a March of Witness or figuratively, is very much part of our normal approach to this season of Passiontide and Easter. We may speak of walking together with our Lord in the Way of the Cross. Not being able to be with one another physically over this season is likely, therefore, to be very difficult for many of us. We will miss those services, gatherings and shared spiritual disciplines in which we would normally participate for our spiritual nourishment and renewal. For many, therefore, there will be a very real sense of loss - privation, even.




But what is becoming clear is that, while we may not gather together in our various places of worship, people are preparing all kinds of means by which the season may still be observed with devotion and joy. I do believe that, despite that which will not be possible, we will find ourselves discovering new insights and riches as we enter into the narrative of our Lord's Passion and Resurrection in new ways. Especially in this time of uncertainty, anxiety and suffering, we may perhaps learn more of what it means 'to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings' (Philippians 3.10).

It is clear that we will be living in this 'strange land' of quasi-exile from our normal patterns of church life and life more generally for some time to come. We are also increasingly aware that people in our own families, households and communities are personally affected – and some, very sadly, have died. Many among us are in some of the 'essential' roles in society and facing considerable pressures in those roles and places. I am, therefore, hugely grateful for all the efforts that are being made to serve those around us, not least to those working with Bishop Simon to guide and strengthen our community outreach at this time.

In days such as these, our commitment to the ministry of prayer with and for our neighbours (in the fullest sense) is paramount. Even if there is nothing else we are able to do, we can pray. And my prayer for all of us is that, in these strange and discomforting times and especially in these coming days, we will walk with our Lord in new ways, standing again at the foot of his Cross and meeting him afresh in the garden of early Easter Day, being fed by him on the lakeside shore. With my prayers and good wishes for God's blessing in this season.

There are those days when the one, who has been running away for years, every week, without fail, ...doesn't.


The day when the disabled one, is finally accepted for who they are.

How Spring Harvest Home content works

YOUTUBE.COM/SPRINGHARVEST

All of our primary content sessions will be streamed at scheduled times at the top of our YouTube homepage – as a Premiere or a Live Stream. Our welcome video will appear there when there is a gap in the schedule. Join us in advance of the week – some things will be there early to give you a head start.

SPRINGHARVEST.ORG

A programme for the week will be published on our website. It is downloadable as a PDF. If you have a printer at home, why not stick it to the fridge and mark what you'd like to see?

If you've signed up for notifications from YouTube \$\mathbb{k}\$, you could be reminded with an email or a phone alert 30 minutes before each major session is due to start.

At any time, you can choose from the videos in our playlists. The best way to get the full picture will be to browse the playlists directly. There is a playlist each for Kids programme, Youth programme, All-Age, Worship, Teaching, BSL/Accessible and Activities. There is also a playlist called Catch Up, which has the films that were shown as part of the primary schedule.


Underneath every film is what's called a 'Bio'. It has information about the film, and if you click SHOW MORE, more will appear, including links to other sites or resources that we think may be relevant. If the film has supporting documents (like kids activity resources), there will be a link there to download them.

If you've never been to Spring Harvest before, it may be useful to know that our primary content is themed and is best watched in order – sessions will be numbered or specified by day in the title if they are part of a series.

Accessibility

You can turn captions (subtitles) on and off at any time, in any film, using this symbol along the bottom 🚍.

We have added BSL interpretation to some sessions and these are in their own playlist to make them easy to find. There are also sessions especially accessible for those with learning difficulties.





HOW TO WATCH

On a computer

The best way to browse and enjoy the content (particularly the first time) is on a desktop or laptop computer. If you are watching the video at the top of the screen, you can join in with the You Tube Chat underneath and interact with others who are watching at the same time. Once you go 'full screen' with the video [7], you can no longer join in with the chat, unless you do so on a separate device at the same time.

- Audio if you are struggling to hear through the internal speakers when the volume is at full (both on the video itself and on the computer) then try watching with headphones, an external speaker, dock or amplifier. These can be used through a jack to jack cable, depending on your technology.
- Visual using an HDMI cable from the computer to your TV or a projector can give you the full screen experience! Check your TV and computer have the right sockets before purchasing a cable.

On a smaller device

You can watch on a smartphone or tablet in just the same way, again, an external speaker may help, and prop it up so you can go hands free and relax.

On your TV

Newer TVs can access YouTube directly and you can watch everything from there. The only downside is that it's not so easy to join in with the interactive 'Chat'. Of course, on a separate device you could join in with that on YouTube, Facebook or Twitter. Newer smart TVs can usually show what is on your smaller device with screen casting or mirroring.

Help

There is loads of technical help available on the internet. If you think you'll need guidance, get ready in advance. YouTube itself has 'How-to' videos on just about everything. You can search there, or on Google. Be direct in the search box. Here are some examples:

How do I get YouTube on my Samsung Smart TV / What's the best speaker to use with my laptop? / What cable do I need for Macbook to LG TV / How to stream my iPad onto my TV.

INTERACTION

You need to be signed in to a Google account to do this (you already have one if you have a Gmail address, or it's free and easy to sign up). You can 'replay' this chat along with the video if you are catching up later. Please note that it is automatically moderated and some content won't be allowed to appear if it's deemed unsuitable.

You can use Facebook, Twitter and Instagram to interact with others, using the hashtag #SH2020, so everyone can get involved. Don't forget to also mention @springharvest if you'd like to make sure our team see it.

From 7pm each evening, for half an hour before the celebration, we'll be showing a selection of your posts in our Live Stream, so send us pictures of your #SH2020 experience. We have 200 limited edition 'Unleashed' mugs (home and travel) to give away as prizes for the best.

As you gather share amongst yourselves what's your favourite Easter tradition? What makes it the best? Are there any you have enjoyed in the past which have slipped away? (Share within your gathering).

We are gathered to celebrate Easter Sunday, the most wonderful day for Christians throughout the world as we celebrate Jesus' resurrection. How would you explain the excitement of Easter to a friend who doesn't know Jesus?


Interactive Learning.....



Draw a cross outline using white glue on paper (looks better on dark colours) and while the glue is wet cover it with salt. Gently tip off the excess. Then colour the salt by gently dabbing dilute water colours over the salt. Food colouring works too.


Watch carefully as the colour spreads throughout the salt, transforming it.





In these times we all feel rather worried and a bit scared — it's all unknown. However, as Mary discovered on the first Easter Jesus IS alive and He is with us. And much like the paint transforms the salt so Jesus can transform us. We still cannot go outside much or see our friends, but Jesus can help us see the colours and good in what we do have and give us hope that a colour filled future will come.





Whilst creating chat about the following questions & share stories...

If you had been sat with Mary in that garden how do you think you may have reacted?

Think of ways the colours of Jesus can transform your life? How can you help others see the difference Jesus makes in you?

As we think of Mary's excitement hearing Jesus say her name, sit and in your head hear Jesus say your name. He speaks to you, what would you like to say to Him? Share your fears with Him and accept His peace. Allow His love to transform you.

Encourage members to pray silently or aloud. Other prayers can be said at this time, concluding with the Lord's Prayer




One of the secretaries where I work at the university, Sabrina, got the coronavirus, but thank God she is now better and working from home.




Phoebe by Paula Gooder



I was returning from Queen Mary's hospital recently when my car suddenly stopped. It was busy as parents were out collecting their children from school. As I sat trying to restart the car and raising my hands in despair with the hazard lights flashing, three or four men came from different directions and started to push me till they found me a parking space. They made sure I was ok and able to call the breakdown service. One father, returning from collecting his child from school, and who had helped me earlier again stopped to make sure I was all right. Again, I really appreciated the kindness of strangers.

Chicken, Ham & Mushroom Pie

Ingredients

1lb / 500g Cooked chicken 4oz / 125g Chunky ham 2oz / 60g Mushrooms 8oz / 250g Frozen puff pastry 1 Egg Thick gravy



Instructions

Dice the chicken and the ham and slice the mushrooms.

Mix the Chicken, ham and mushrooms with the gravy and pour the mixture into a pie dish.

Roll out the puff pastry and cover the mixture in the pie dish.

Beat the egg and brush onto the pastry top.

Bake in the oven for 45 minutes on gas mark 4 / 160°C.

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THE CUPBOARD UNDER THE STAIRS

The ANNUAL MEETING LAST YEAR set up the ELDERSHIP which almost immediately advised that we should have a SPRING CLEAN of the Church. This was not a "physical" one, but an examination of our church's life and priority. From Autumn 1986 onwards, the committees and groups of the church came under scrutiny. We thought that nothing had been overlooked. We asked JIM SMITH of the Church Pastoral Aid Society to check our work, and lead us on into Mission.

Sometimes when a SPRING CLEAN is done, a cupboard will be discovered (for example under the stairs) which may have been easily overlooked. In it is all kinds of rubbish. This cupboard is usually out of sight and out of mind. It is however, an extremely valuable place, and also needs to be cleaned! I believe that Jim unearthed a "CUPBOARD UND" THE STAIRS" at St. Paul's. Jim questioned whether we are ready for a major outreach campaign. He felt that there were certain things that had to be put right first. The outstanding thing is the PRAYER LIFE of the Church.

Jim spoke about the need for learning INTERCEDING PRAYER. He talked about the need to be really concerned for the Church to reach the world; to really pray and want our family, friends and neighbours to become Christians. If the Church is not growing, then we need to be desperate before God, and plead for Him to bless us. Jim wondered whether we were concerned in that way. Our answer must be to respond and seek the Lord.

Many of us have been reading the book "Listening to God" by Joyce Huggett during Lent, and feel that the Lord is reinforcing the message - we must commit ourselves to "interceding prayer". After Easter the Bible School will be based on Jesus' great PRAYER OF INTERCESSION (John Chapter 17) and the Cell Groups will have similar themes for discussion. We hope to form prayer triplets, and have a half night of prayer. The call to prayer is to seek the way forward. This will only have real value if the Church as a whole commits itself. I invite you to share with me, as we SEEK THE LORD'S WILL AND BLESSING.

Music Review

Band member, Bob Lindridge gives his opinion of Matt Redman's latest offering.



Let there be wonder by Matt Redman

Matt Redman is an English Christian worship leader, songwriter and author. He has made 16 CDs and written 8 books. He was born in 1974 and now lives in Californi. He is probably best known for his award winning song "10,000 Reasons" which we sing at St.Paul's during our 10.30am service.



His songs have been covered by many contemporary Christian music artists and he has worked alongside other well-known Christian musicians e.g. Chris Tomlinson and Tim Hughes.

This new CD is typical Redman. If you are looking for a congregational worship anthem in the veins of "10,000 Reasons" – look no further. "We Praise You" is structured around the theme that praise is a weapon against the Enemy. The song has some powerful verses with an equally powerful chorus.

"King Jesus" modulates its tender verses with an energetic chorus, ideal for worship.

The CD title song, "Let there be wonder" may not be as dynamic as "King Jesus" but the way the chorus speaks of the wonderful ways of The 31 Father, is simply captivating.

"Merciful Father" has the infectious line "you're rich in love" and is one of those songs you go away humming after you have heard it. This is possibly the secret ingredient why many churches latch onto Redman songs.

"All Praise" is very reminiscent of Redman's earlier compositions and focuses on God's amazing grace for us.

If you are looking for a heart tugging ballad - "Jesus Your name" is the one to use.

The track "The same Jesus" is perhaps the least enthused track on the album. This maybe because of its repetitious chorus. The track is not representative of all the gems on this CD.

If you tuned into the morning service at All Souls - Langham Place on Palm Sunday, you would have sung along with "Upon Him"

The songs are generally written in a high key which makes it difficult for churches to use the CD in church worship. This flaw is found on far too many worship recordings these days. Whenever the St. Paul's Band introduces a new song, attention has to be made to the selection of a key that the congregation would find it easy to sing.

This CD will not disappoint. The songs are not just to be enjoyed but they are (in Redman's words) made to "silence the enemy".
