

A FAREWELL LETTER FROM Mr. CHANT.

Dear Friends,

Your Vicar has kindly extended to me this opportunity of writing a few words before I leave you. So I begin by saying "thank you" to him. It is now two years since I came to Northumberland Heath. These

It is now two years since I came to Northumberland Heath. These have been two very happy years for me, due largely to your co-operation at all times. It is not every curate who finds things as smooth. So, in the second place, I must say "thank you" to you for the way you have assisted the Vicar and myself in our endeavour to build up St. Paul's after the critical period it had passed through during the war years.

In leaving you there is one word I would like to bequeath to you as a congregation. It is what St. Paul wrote to St. Timothy: "Hold fast the form of sound words, which thou hast heard of me in faith and love which is in Christ Jesus. That good thing which was committed unto thee, keep, by the Holy Spirit which dwelleth in us." (2 Tim. 1, vv. 13, 14).

It is much easier to do this when we band together as a congregation of faithful people than it is when we try going our own way. And so, as I am about to leave you, I do express the hope that the present team spirit will continue for years to come. There are signs that St. Paul's Church is capable of holding the traditions it has received from the past. There is no grander work than carrying on the Christian Faith from one generation to the next. It is a high calling, and I believe you will rise to the confidence the Master is placing in you, and I trust your faith will continue to be rooted in the Lord Jesus Christ and in Him alone.

Finally, may I request your prayers for me in my future ministry at Great Houghton, Yorks, where I shall be curate-in-charge. Like St. Paul's, the people there hold the puritan traditions which they have inherited from previous curates. By God's Grace I hope to minister to their spiritual needs just as it has been my privilege here in Northumber-

land Heath.

MISSIONARY.

Missionary Exhibition.

Our five day Missionary Exhibition is now over. We have seen something of the problems facing the new community in many parts of the world, the situation to-day and the possibilities of the future for the women of the East, the bridges that need building between the Hindu and Moslem and Pakistan, the development of Christianity in China from the year St. Augustine came to England and the special problems and opportunities of Christian work among the Jews.

We have seen something of the life of an Indian Village and the degraded existence of the Outcaste. Among such people the Rev. and Mrs. Beall, and the Nurse whose salary we supply at Alwaye are working. The problems of the development of East Africa have also been placed before us.

We have heard of the work in their own area from Missionaries who have taken part in the Exhibition. Miss Short from India, Mrs. Macpherson, India, Dr. C. Bacon, China, Miss Wilson, Palestine, the Rev. and Dr. Roberts, West Africa, Miss Hammond, C.M.J., Miss Pittock, C.E.Z.M.S., and Rev. W. F. Jones, C.M.S.

The difficulties confronting Missionaries were realistically shown in the Goodenough Household in "The Link that Nearly Broke" and the marked enange in the position when Christian people at home are shown the need and follow God's lead.

What are we going to do about it?

Perhaps there are some who will do nothing. For them the Exhibition has been a failure and the appeals of the Missionaries will fall on deaf ears.

There are some who will want to take a share and have already asked for a Missionary Box and a Missionary Magazine in which to learn more of the work for Christ in many lands. May there be many more to help forward God's work in this way. Perhaps there are some who have realised that God is calling them for work in His vineyard.

For one such person this Exhibition will have been abundantly worthwhile. Let us pray that work begun may be continued steadfastly in His service.

May we thank all our many friends – far too many to mention by name —who took part in the Exhibition.

Facts.

To make the health service in Great Britain similar to that in India, it would be necessary to take away

5 out of every 6 doctors 99 out of every 100 dentists

99 out of every 100 trained nurses 29 out of every 30 hospital beds.

It is repeatedly stated that there is a desperate shortage of nurses in this country, there being one nurse to every 2,000 people. In India there is only one for every 43,000.

In Nigeria there is only one doctor for every 80,000 of the population.

Missionary Society for service overseas.

THE ENGLISH PRAYER BOOK.

Quartercentenary Meeting, June 23rd.

Under the presidency of the Bishop of Rochester a public meeting will be held in the Kingsway Hall, London, on Thursday, June 23rd, at 6.30 p.m., in connection with this year's celebration of the fourth centenary

of the English Prayer Book.

The speakers will be the Bishop of Worcester, Dr. W. Wilson Cash, who will speak on the Prayer Book in the Anglican Communion; Archdeacon D. E. W. Harrison of Sheffield, who will deal with the Prayer Book in its historical setting; and the Provost of Bradford, the Very Rev. John G. Tiarks, who will talk about the use of the Prayer Book in the life and worship of the Church.

The meeting should prove to be a really inspiring occasion when all loyal churchmen may join to give thanks to God for their great heritage

in the Book of Common Prayer.

Admission to the meeting will be by ticket. The price of reserved seats is 1/-, but for parties of ten or over seats will be reserved at 6d. per head. Arrangements are being made to organize such a party from this parish, and it is hoped that many will avail themselves of this special opportunity. Application for tickets should be made to the Vicar. who will also be glad to supply all further information.
