

THE VICAR'S LETTER

My dear Friends,

I am writing this letter on the fourth anniversary of my institution as Vicar of St. Paul's, and so I may be pardoned if I use the occasion for one or two reflections.

It was on July 20th, 1950, that I became your Vicar. It was a big day in my life, for it was the start of my first incumbency, and I remember entering upon it with considerable fear and trembling, aroused not by your fearsomeness (for you really are not fearsome!), but by the challenge of taking on such a responsible task with so few natural resources. However, it was with a real sense of God's call that I came, and that sense of vocation sustained me then and still sustains me now. I am reminded of a verse in Exodus: "If thou shalt do this thing, and God command thee so, then thou shalt be able to endure, and all this people shall also go to their place in peace." (18, 23). If God command thee so, then thou shalt be able . .! That is a thought for us all to take to heart. What God calls us to, we can do, however inadequate we may feel in ourselves. I would ask you to remember this particularly in the days that lie ahead, when, as I believe, God is calling us all to a special task of witness in this parish.

The awareness of God calling me to this parish was met in the event by much kindness and patience on your part, and the result now is that initial fears have given way to genuine hopes. I think the outlook in our church and parish is hopeful. Only a tiny fraction of the parish meet for worship at St. Paul's (a very tiny fraction), but there is the stirring of new life amongst our church membership which is the promise of greater things to come. What is required is that each of you should be faithful (not least in the matter of regular worship in church Sunday by Sunday without fail), and zealous in your desire and determination that God's work shall go forward in our parish. Together and united we can, under God, go forward to great things; divided, indifferent, going our own ways, each one being a law unto himself, and without any bond of common loyalty and obligation, we shall fail and our hopes will be unrealised. The possibility of failure is always with us, but the greater possibility (if I read the present situation in our church aright) is that we shall make real and permanent progress in the days ahead. I am full of hope.

After four years in the parish and with three of our children born during, our time here, I think we can perhaps claim to be, as a family, genuine North Heathens now (using that term in a local and not an irreligious sense!). I would like to end by saying how much kindness and helpfulness my wife and I have received from you in our home and family life, for which we are most grateful.

MISSIONARY NOTES

READY TO HEAR

All over the world there are people ready to hear and receive the Gospel.

A C.M.S. missionary in Hong Kong tells of a recent experience: "I was asked to speak to the whole of the senior section and staff of a local school during the Chinese New Year holiday. I gave two talks of some 45 minutes each. Later I was amazed and thrilled to hear that after the talks some sixty students asked for further instruction in the Christian faith, and some sixteen others, including members of the staff, asked definitely for preparation for baptism. One can only say that it was due to the work of the Holy Spirit."

THE BIBLE IN KASHMIR

A C.M.S. missionary in Kashmir has reported a growing interest in the Christian faith and in the Bible: "Day by day," she writes, "we see more and more men sitting reading by our bookstall. One or two have asked to borrow copies of the Bible so that they may read them at home."

LAY LEADERSHIP IN AFRICA

1. An African accountant holding a very responsible position with a large industrial undertaking in East Africa has just tendered his resignation in order to train as an evangelist. In a recent letter he said: "God has been speaking to me and showing me the senior catechists and layreaders who have been in the work for many years; and the question has been haunting me: what will happen to the work when these faithful men go?"
