

My dear Friends,

The New Parish Hall.

Early next month, D.V., we hope to launch the St. Paul's Appeal for a new Parish Hall and Sunday School, a need of the utmost urgency.

It is a tremendous privilege and responsibility to have more than 500 children and young people in our various organisations, including 300 in our Sunday Schools, but the work is sadly hampered and restricted because of the existing old and dilapidated premises.

The existing Parish Room beside the Church, originally the Mission Church, was designed in 1874 for work among a village community of only 250 people. There are today some 15,000 parishioners, and the old Parish Room is still the only permanent building available. The Diocesan expert has said that the existing Parish Room and the "Iron Room" behind it could not be adapted into any new building scheme and must be demolished to make way for a new and up-to-date combined Parish Hall and Sunday School.

Will you help? A sum of £10,000 is required for this new building, which must be worthy of the cause we represent, as well as an advertisement of our zeal for the Lord.

The Diocese, through the Church Extension Scheme, has promised us half of the total cost as soon as money is available, which possibly may be next year. In the meantime we must raise our £5,000 as quickly as possible, and our St. Paul's Appeal, which will last for one year, is especially directed to all friends who believe that our Christian Way, and our Gospel, constitute "the one thing needful".

How you can help: By giving your services as a helper and by being responsible for one road, or part of a road, in the parish. Will you please give your name to me, or to a Church Officer, at your earliest convenience. We need 40 more volunteers.

It is estimated that if every family in the parish were able to give 6d. a week, we should at the end of the year's appeal have the grand total of £4,787, i.e. only £213 short of our target.

As I bring this letter to a close at the height of the holiday season, may I wish all of you who are on holiday, or are about to go away, a most refreshing and happy time. A warm welcome awaits all of you in the fellowship of the Church on your return.

CHRISTIAN GIVING. Three Proved Ways.

There is some confusion in many Christian peoples' minds about their personal giving to the work of the Church. The confusion centres in the fact that they have not so far worked out for themselves all that is involved in discipleship. The principle to bear in mind is that one's giving to God is an integral part of our worship and of our stewardship of life, and not merely a matter of dropping a coin carelessly into the plate. Our giving to God should be cheerful, generous, and disciplined.

The following are three ways of giving which are worthy of attention:—

(i) Tithe Giving: This is not strictly enjoined upon the Christian in the New Testament, where the standard of giving is "all". When we commit our lives to God we hold nothing back. The Gospels speak to us of the "Widow's Mite", which was all she had, but the point which Our Lord makes about our giving is not so much the size of the gift as the cost of it to us.

The Old Testament tithe was "a tenth of total income", which had to be paid for the maintenance of the Jewish priesthood and the work of God. Few Christians give anything like this. However, we must be sensible about our Christian Giving: we should remember that the Old Testament communities were simple agricultural groups, who had no other rates and taxes, and few, if any, other public commitments apart from their tithe. Their living conditions were primitive, but in spite of it, they could give one tenth of their complete living, of the little they had, to God. The challenge to a Christian must obviously be, "I have, in Christ, so much more to be thankful for than the Jews of old, can I give less than they did?"

If every member of our congregation tithed, the result would truly be staggering. Tithing means that of one's "tenth" so much would be given to the Parish Church, and the remainder carefully allocated to various Christian enterprises, particularly missionary work.

- (ii) Regular Giving: This is of the greatest importance. Our Church Records show that every year (1957 is no exception) from Whitsun to late September the weekly offertory drops by anything up to £3. It is because members of the Church are frequently away either on holiday, or for other reasons. A Church member ought to set aside a regular sum every week for the work of the Church, following the pattern set in the New Testament. The Freewill Offering can help you here.
- (iii) Covenanted Giving: This is a method by which we can almost double our giving to God without any other cost than that of a little discipline and trouble. It concerns particularly all those who pay income tax at the standard rate of 8/6d, in the £, although it also includes all who pay income tax.

This is how the scheme works: The subscriber decides what he would like to give weekly to the Church—say 2/- per week—i.e., £5.4.0d, per year. He then signs a form promising to do this for seven years. As a result the Church Treasurer can then at the end of each year claim back from Inland Revenue the refund of tax amounting to almost £4, which increases the gift to more than £9.

More information about this scheme will be found on the Church literature table. The Vicar or Church Treasurer will be pleased to give any other help that may be required.

PARISH VISITING.

The first stage of our parish visiting campaign for this year has just been concluded, after six weeks of special effort. Door to door visiting is never easy, however experienced one might be, and it has been a thrill to have some twenty or so people willing to help in this important Christian enterprise. Generally speaking, the visitors have been warmly received by the people of Northumberland Heath, who have been quick to appreciate the fact that the Church is alive and active, and is reaching out to their homes.

It is not easy to assess immediately the result of this special visiting effort, but already a number of new faces have been seen in Church on recent Sundays as a direct result of the quiet and warm welcome

extended on Thursday evenings.

A special feature of the visiting has been the number of encouraging contacts made with new-comers to the parish, and the willingness of many non Church-goers to talk frankly about spiritual matters with their visitors. The total impression given is that many people are thinking seriously about the claims of Christianity and the Gospel, and long for a real experience of God, even if they would not put it quite like that. There is then real evidence that the Holy Spirit is at work in our parish. And as a result of our experiences recently, we may, in the words of the Apostle, "Thank God, and take courage."

THE SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The Sunday School Anniversary Services are now perhaps little more than a pleasant memory. What a thrill it was to see the Church so crowded throughout the day, in spite of the intense heat wave. The children who took part either in the recitations or in the Sunday School Choir deserve our heartiest congratulations. A special word of thanks is due to the Superintendents, teachers, and choirmaster for much hard work put in beforehand.

The Kindergarten Sunday Schools enjoyed a very pleasant picnic on Saturday, 13th July, at Shenstone Park. The weather, though threatening, was quite good, and an enjoyable time was had by all. We would take this opportunity to thank Mrs. Bye for the major contribution she has made to the Community Centre Department, and we wish her every happiness in her temporary retirement. Mrs. Rosina Ford is the new Superintentendent at the Community Centre and we wish her a long tenure of office and much happiness.

The Junior Sunday School were unfortunate in that their picnic on Saturday, 20th July, was upset by torrential rain and thunder storms, but in spite of the weather the children enjoyed a coach ride into the surrounding countryside, and games and tea in the Community Centre afterwards.


