

Missionary Week End.

Our Missionary Week, Saturday, Nov. 29th—Monday, Dec. 1st, began with an Overseas Afternoon in the Church Hall on Saturday, at 3 o'clock, when we were privileged to have with us Mrs. B. Beall, in place of Mrs. Crowley, who was undergoing an operation, as our Lady Opener. Both Rev. and Mrs. Beall are Missionary Recruits and are going to Alwaye in the Spring. Mrs. Beall will be taking a special interest in the work of the Dispensary at Alwaye which was built by our first Vicar, the Rev. H. W. Watson, and at which the Nurse whose salary we supply, works. The Vicar presided, and Mr.

Bengough expressed the thanks of all to Mrs. Beall, who has promised to write from Alwaye giving up-to-date news of the work there to all who would like to hear from her. A bouquet was presented to Mrs. Beall by Miss Rosemary Manning, a Member of the Discoverers of the Way. The Stallholders were:—Mothers' Union (Gifts); Mr. and Mrs. Clarke (White Elephant); Sunday Schools (Stationery); Mr. and Bengough, Miss Russell (Books); Women's Fellowship (Medical); the Discoverers of the Way (Village Stores); and Mrs. Manning (Teas and Refreshments). Mr. Bennett was in charge of the sale of Programmes and the Scouts helped with the erection of the Stalls.

An interesting exhibit, "A Look at India," was supplied by the Church Missionary Society. A Puppet Show was given by the Discoverers and two of the members, Rosemary Manning and Margaret Messer gave a recitation.

Our special preacher for the Sunday was the Rev. V. T. Kurien from Alwaye. Mr. Kurien spoke of the Church in S. India, and also of the Christian work at Alwaye, telling us something of the Union Christian College there, of the Alwaye Settlement from which Mr. Mathunni who visited us in July, 1946, came, and of the Dispensary which we have helped to support since 1939. Unfortunately the programme planned for Monday—a film on India to be given by Rev. Walter F. Jones—could not be given. Owing to the dense fog it was impossible either for Mr. Jones or the projector and films to reach us.

We were particularly pleased to welcome Rev. and Mrs. Roberts and the Rev. and Mrs. Middleton from Christ Church, Bexleyheath and also members from the neighbouring parishes of All Saints', Belvedere, Christ Church, Erith, and St. Martin's, Barnehurst.

The final figures are not yet complete but we know that with donations already received the amount required for the salary of a Nurse, £40, will be reached.

We are very grateful to Mr. A. J. Mott, who so kindly gave us the bouquet, to all the Stallholders and organisations who supported us and to all who helped in any way.
