LETTER.

My dear Friends,

What about our children?

No greater responsibility has been placed upon the Christian Church than the Ascensiontide command of Jesus Christ to "Feed my Lambs" In recent years, however, this injunction has become more and more difficult to fulfil, in the sense of giving spiritual instruction to young people. Their own parents often obstruct us in the doing of it. They give no real Christian teaching themselves to their children and do not send them to Church, Sunday School or youth movement to enable us to do it.

Alas, it is obviously true that only a small minority of our children are being given the chance to be won to Jesus Christ either at home, or through our church organisations. But for all the jokes cracked by feeble wits about "old maid" Sunday School teachers . . . THE BILL IS COMING It is not so funny now that we can see what this neglect involves, Juvenile and other crime is so appallingly widespread in every strata of social strata and is the current concern in every responsible quarter from Parliament downwards. What is going on all around us is the product of a society, the majority of whom are completely indifferent to the principles and practices of moral and spiritual values.

In a recent survey in Manchester it was revealed that over 70% of youths between the ages of 14 and 25 were untouched by Church, Evening Institute, voluntary organisation or wholesome club of any kind. Greater

Londons statistics would not make better reading.

What are we to make of parents who say, "We do not intend to give our children any religious teaching at all: they must make up their own minds." Is there anything in this that we can respect? What they mean is that their children are not even to be brought up as little pagansbecause even pagans believe in a god of some sort-but as little secularists who have no conception of the super-natural, no idea of reverence developing in their minds at all; who suppose that the universe is entirely material and belongs to man not God, and whose ideas about life are buttressed by no spiritual sanctions at all.

It must be said kindly but plainly: such talk about leaving children to develop their own religious ideas is utter nonsense. How do you answer a child's deeper questions which begin to come in his tenderest years. Do you really suppose that children can hold their minds in suspense for 16 or 17 years—the most formative years of their lives—and then survey with some measure of detachment the great religious figures of history— Jesus, or Buddha, or Mohammed, or Confucious? Or shall I sing my hymns to science and the nuclear bomb?

It seems utterly foolish for people to think like that. Children have the right to the best that the race has developed in all its long history. To the best in medicine and surgery, in hygiene and social welfare, to the best in education, and the best, therefore, in religion. As a student of comparative religion for some years, it seems to me to be obvious that the best the world ever learned about religion centres in Jesus Christ. I pay a willing tribute to whatever has come to our poor race by the illumination of good men everywhere. I speak with reverence of the holy books of other faiths, but God who "at sundry times and in diverse manners" has spoken in time past by the sages of many religions, spoke at the last unto us by His Son, and that revelation supersedes all others.

Will you deny your children the best faith? If you wish to be really broad-minded can't you be as broad-minded in other ways too? Why not leave your children to their own ideas about manners and social etiquette until they are 17. We know, of course, the folly of this, that if we do not teach them manners they will make them on their own as they go along, and they will be pretty poor ones. So it is with regard to these most important things in life, they will get their own from somewhere, and they'll be pretty poor ones too. They will suppose that the world was made just for them. Egotism and self will guide their actions. Greed will be the key to a great deal of their conduct. Is this not what is happening about us to-day?

It is dawning on parents and child experts that after all children need guidance in everything, and that there is that in human nature which needs moulding and disciplining. Are we going to leave our children to themselves at the very point where they need help most of all? The greatest sufferers from the neglect of religious instruction are the children themselves. To let them grow up without the gracious influence of Christ on their lives is pure tragedy, and a sin against their unformed natures.

"Feed my lambs," said Jesus before the Ascension. "Feed my lambs."

We in the church, want to take our share in fulfilling that injunction. The lambs are best fed in the home, but we are eager to co-operate with the home. I plead with all you who are parents, or have influence on other parents, to take this counsel to heart.

GARDEN PARTY.

Special Attractions.

Our recent missionary week-end was one of the most successful and helpful ever. It was certainly true of the missionary market, evening rally, and the able ministry of the Rev. P. J. Ross, M.A., of Nigeria, and Mrs. J. H. Hewitt until recently of Western Pakistan.

The Missionary Market was well attended in spite of the heat wave conditions. The stalls were amply stocked and well decorated, and it was only with some difficulty that the Lady Opener, Miss M. M. L. Pirouet, on furlough from Kenya, was able to decide the best dressed stall. Congratulations to the Youth Fellowship on winning the shield for this year.

The Saturday evening rally, which was a high-light of the week-end, included the presentation of our "missionary tent" to the Rev. Canon A. Lawrence Barham, head of the Ruanda Mission.
