PREPARING TO MEET TOGETHER

Clive welcomed everyone to the meeting and prayed.

MEETING OF THE PARISHIONERS

1. Minutes of the meeting held on Wednesday, 27th April 2022

Clive referred to the minutes of the meeting held on Wednesday, 27th April 2022. No amendments were raised. **Those parishioners present were asked to formally agree the minutes as a true record of the meeting. This was Proposed by Lauraine Wells and Seconded by Monica Lindridge. There was a unanimous show of hands in agreement.**

2. Election of Churchwarden

Clive said that no-one had come forward to take on the role. If anyone was willing to be a churchwarden they could be elected by the PCC.

ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING

1. Appointment of Secretary for the APCM

1.1 Clive proposed that Christine Minns be appointed as Secretary to the APCM. **This was Proposed by Lauraine Wells and Seconded by Veronica Ralph. There was a unanimous show of hands in agreement.**

2. Apologies

2.1 Apologies were received from Grace & Bill Allan, Philippa Beazley-Long, Sue Earley, Ann Easter, Marjorie Hoare, Alex & Wai Ming Martin, Chris Meaton, Alison McGill, John Ralph, Karen Silver, Judy & Colin Smith and Jeanette Watts.

3. Minutes of the Meeting held on Wednesday, 27th April 2022

3.1 Clive referred to the minutes of the meeting held on Wednesday, 27th April 2022. No amendments were raised. **Those present were asked to formally agree the minutes as a true record of the meeting. This was Proposed by Peter Green and Seconded by Bob Lindridge. There was a unanimous show of hands in agreement.**

4. Report on the Electoral Roll

4.1 Referring to his report in the booklet of reports, Peter said that the numbers were down from 69 to 56. The next revision of the Electoral Roll was due in 2025 and there was a need to give out the forms for people to complete, as well as the Data Protection forms. Elaine said that we needed to let the people attending the 10.30 am service, know what it was about.

5. Report of the Activity of the PCC

5.1 Clive referred to the report of the activities of the PCC in the booklet of reports.

6. Report on the Financial Statements of the Church in 2022

6.1 Charles referred to the Annual Report and Financial Statements and his report in the booklet of reports. He said that 2022 had been slightly better than the previous year. The church had spent £8,542 more than its income, but the Pre-School had made a small profit. He thanked all those who had helped him: Bob & Monica Lindridge, Dot Turner for reclaiming the Gift Aid back from HMRC, and Linda Mayes and Monica for dealing with the hall bookings. Clive thanked Charles for his hard work and also thanked the team of people helping with the finances.

7. Report on the Fabric, goods and ornaments of the church

7.1 Clive referred to the work being done during the year listed in the booklet. The repair to the chancel window was in progress and may be done in June, which was being paid for by the insurance company. He said that he had carried out a survey for the Ecclesiastical Insurance Company. There was a 5 year electrical check with some work outstanding and a fire risk check had been carried out this year.

8. Report on the proceedings of the Deanery Synod

8.1 Peter referred to his report on the Deanery Synod in the booklet. He said that the Synod had met with the new Archdeacon for Bexley and Bromley, Alison Kerr. The new Area Dean was Jim Bennett of St Augustine's, Slade Green.

9. Election of 2 Deanery Synod Members

9.1 Clive said that the election of our 2 Deanery Synod members was due this year and Brenda Reid and Peter Green had volunteered to continue in the role. Brenda's nomination was Proposed by Lauraine Wells and Seconded by Monica Lindridge. Peter's nomination was Proposed by Elaine Fermer and Seconded by Lauraine Wells. They were duly elected. Clive thanked them for serving on the Synod.

10. Report on Safeguarding

10.1 Referring to the report in the booklet, Clive said that Felicia Ayeyemi had taken on the role of Safeguarding Officer from Jackie Robinson who was stepping down. Clive thanked Jackie for her time in the role.

11. Election of PCC Representatives

11.1 Clive said there had been no nominations for new PCC representatives, but if someone would like to volunteer they could be co-opted onto the PCC and then elected at the next APCM.

12. Appointment of Independent Examiner for year 2023

12.1 Clive said that Keith Varney, who had acted as our Independent Examiner for 2022, had indicated that he was willing to continue to do this. **Those present were asked to formally agree to the appointment of Keith Varney as our Independent Examiner for 2023. This was Proposed by Charles Brooke and Seconded by Peter Green. There was a unanimous show of hands in agreement.** Clive asked that our thanks to Keith be noted in the minutes.

13. Vicar's Concluding Remarks

12.1 Clive thanked the PCC members, the leadership team and all those who helped in the church. He said there was evidence of new life and growth in the church. The number of children and teenagers was going up as well as the provision for them. There was broadly the same number of people attending as before Covid, but they were not attending so often at the various services. We needed to encourage and welcome them back.

12.2 Monica asked about the confirmation. Clive said that there were to be baptisms for 4 or 5 people on 7th May, the day after the Coronation. The confirmation service was being planned for Sunday, 10th September, with Bishop Jonathan taking the service. He said there might be interest from other churches in the Deanery. Bob asked about the Alpha courses, both youth and adult. Clive said it was something we wanted to do and needed to organise. Clive said that “Churches Together in Erith” had reformed with 39 churches signed up, including North Heath (9 churches), Slade Green and Erith. It was just beginning to meet up and with youth workers. Clive said there was a “Praise Event” planned, possibly at the end of May, which Kate Foot was co-ordinating. Regarding the Erith Deanery Youth Trust, Monica reported that Lauren Webster had resigned the previous year. Lydia Futter, from Christchurch Bexleyheath, had been appointed in her place and would start on 1st May. Lydia wanted to meet with “Children’s Church” groups in all the Bexleyheath churches in the area. Monica hoped that she would visit St Paul’s. Monica said they were doing Lay Minister training.

14. Concluding Prayers

14.1 Clive prayed and the meeting closed at 7.29 pm. 15 people attended.

2023 CHURCH FINANCES

In 2023, our total receipts £179,842 included Preschool income of £85,938, with total expenditure £187,345 included Preschool expenditure £106,277. The church gained £12,834 (largely due to not covering the incumbent's wages) and Preschool had a loss of £20,338.

I need to say thank you to everyone who has helped me this year. Firstly, thanks to Dot Turner who reclaims the Gift Aid back from HMRC. Thank you to Bob and Monica for counting the church collections and banking the money. Also, thank you to Linda Mayes and Monica for taking bookings for our church premises and for chasing our regular hall users for their rent.

The church gas and electricity bills increased considerably at the end of 2022. As a result, the PCC decided to reduce the amount we pay to Rochester diocese in 2023. The amount we are paying no longer covers the wages of our Vicar. This may make it more difficult to get a new Vicar, if Clive leaves. We are paying more to the diocese in 2024, but still not enough to cover the Vicar's wages.

2023 MISSIONARY GIVING

Each year, the church allocates 10% of its income from money given to the church for missionary giving. The MOG committee decides how this should be allocated.

In 2023, £80 each month was given to each of the church's mission partners (Beryl Baker, Sue Bray, Tearfund and CRiBS). Other money was given to help in emergency situations. In 2023, donations were made in response to the CRiBS 30th anniversary appeal, Transfer Bexley Borough (including for the 2023 Erith Praise event), the Turkey/Syria earthquake appeal and the St. Martin in the Fields homeless appeal. In addition, we sent extra money to Beryl Baker, who continued to have financial problems last year.

At Christmas, money was collected for the Demelza hospice and CRiBS.

REPORT ON CHURCH FABRIC, FABRIC AND ORNAMENTS

- A suspected water leak from the church hall was investigated and fixed
- Various problems with lights and taps were fixed

PCC REPORT FOR 2023

The Parochial Church Council met regularly during 2023. The regular meetings of the Standing Committee have ceased and they are now only held on an ad hoc basis, plus one to discuss the church budget for the following year.

The PCC considers many key items, including safeguarding regulations, updates on the preschool, as well as on the upkeep and repairs to the church buildings, including the heating and repair to the window in the chancel, among other things. A major subject last year was the resurfacing of the car park, which has finally been done in 2024.

Our finances are always of considerable concern, especially with the rising costs of gas and electricity, and paying the bills for repairs and other work. Our treasurer, Charles Brooke, works hard to keep a check on our expenses and keeps the PCC up to date on the state of the church finances. In December the budget for 2024 was discussed, including the amount we pay to Rochester for the Parish Pledge. The PCC agreed the recommendations of the Standing Committee, which included not changing the church fees for weddings, funerals and baptisms and the rental for hiring the hall.

The minutes of the PCC meetings are put on the notice board (by the window with the cross) for everyone to read.

REPORT ON THE DEANERY SYNOD

There have been business meetings of Synod during the last year.

ST PAUL'S PRESCHOOL

At present we have 29 children on roll with 6 starting after Easter.

Since September 2023 we have looked at several topics including "All about Me" which involved the children looking at things around them and their emotions. The children also looked at "Everyday Heroes" like doctors, police, dentists (all the children were given their own toothbrush and toothpaste to take home after being taught the correct way to clean their teeth). We also studied "Nursery Rhymes". Each topic is followed up by a specific book. The children also look at a different colour, number and shape each week.

We have covered various religious festivals including Chinese New Year, Easter, Christmas, Diwali, St Patrick's day and Mothering Sunday. Each of these topics involve storytelling, crafts and songs.

Bob and Monica come in regularly to take singing sessions with the children. They also get out all the musical instruments for the children to accompany them with. True heroes.

At Christmas we held our annual nativity in the church which was great. It was slightly different this year as we had a large number of younger children. All children were involved in the singing but only the older ones were given speaking parts in the play. All the children could dress up. It was a very noisy, colourful spectacular, much enjoyed by all the parents, grandparents and carers. Clive showed a video of the Christmas story. The children also

made their Christingles with the help of parents, and we went into the church to sing. Father Christmas came to the Christmas party and handed out presents to all the children.

An Easter Bonnet Parade was held in the church and the hats were judged by Clive. We had a small service at which a video was shown, and the children sang some Easter songs.

Parents have been pleased with all the pictures and notes about their child/children the staff have uploaded on Tapestry and many parents now put pictures and comments of their own on the children's activities. The staff put up new Home Learning links for parents to practice phonics with their children every Friday.

During the year we have upgraded the garden which now includes a sensory area. The children enjoy mark making on the three new blackboards. There are also some new toys to play with plus new signs. It's looking much more colourful. Our thanks go to Jack, the parents' rep for always being willing to jump in to put things up and do running repairs.

All children and their parents/carers were invited to a trip organised by staff to Woodlands Farm just before Easter where they all had an amazing time.

Also, just before Easter we had a phone call from Ofsted. A tense time for all the staff as there is only an afternoon to prepare for the visit the following day. Bhaggya had trained the staff well and we were given a solid GOOD. So very well done all, especially to Bhaggya who has had a busy, exhausting but EXCELLENT first year as Manager, ably assisted by Sam. In fact, all the staff have worked really hard in what has been a challenging year.

The Management Committee's heartfelt thanks go to Bhaggya, Sam, Faye, Pippa and Tanya for a very successful year, producing some very happy children.

We still receive bread from our local bread factory, Hovis and we appreciate that. They are very generous to our local community.

Bexley Women's Aid are very appreciative of all we give them, as are individuals in need. There is a great need for Foodbanks at present and we are pleased to have been able to give some donations to the Slade Green Community Foodbank when their supplies became very low.
